WELCOME TO KNARESBOROUGH



It has often been said that Bed Racing is to Knaresborough what rain is to Manchester, and this year is no different with the 52nd annual staging of this great event. The theme, Heroes and Villains, tips its hat to the many thousands of local people who have taken part over the years, sacrificing their social life as they train for one of Britain's most gruelling athletic contests.

It isn't all hardship, though, as the months of training take folk through some of the most spectacular scenery in the North of England. Knaresborough has much to offer: parkland, steep climbs to the town centre, cobblestones and ancient buildings, a ruined castle standing on a promontory high above the Nidd Gorge, and the magical River Nidd itself.

The name 'Nidd' means bright and sparkling and watch day or night, winter or summer, and you will see how lights, whether from sun or stars, glitter with romantic promise. It is as old as time, yet fresh

fast flowing coming down from the high ground of the Yorkshire Dales.


If you are a visitor to Knaresborough make sure you come to the War Memorial in the Castle grounds and gaze out over the river, the crags of the gorge and the hills far away. Climb down to the Waterside which has cafes antiques, pubs and bookshops as wends its way from Conyngham and onto Abbey Road.

Look out for the House in the Rock and St Robert's Chapel both carved out of the cliff face and the famous tree sculptures.

Across the river is Mother Shipton's Cave and Petrifying Well, known as England's oldest visitor attraction, being open since 1630. Mother Shipton was the prophetess Ursula Southeil, who lived in the late 15th Century and was born in a cave on the west side of the Nidd. One of her supposed predictions was that the end of the world will come when High Bridge falls down.

There is a pub called the World's End and bed racers run past it twice on the course and also cross High Bridge. Hopefully, nothing untoward will happen on Saturday 10 June this year!

It is a wonderful place, Knaresborough, with a delight around every corner. Runners will tell you that the Villain of the piece - just as locals say the True Hero of Bed Race - is the Town itself.



HEROES AND VILLAINS



Over the centuries, Knaresborough has had its fair share of the good and bad, and possibly some of the ugly too. Ours is a small town, today not more than 15,000 inhabitants, but we have turned out some fiery characters down the years.



John Metcalf

Take John Metcalf. better known as Blind Jack. whose tri-centenary we celebrate this year in August (described in more detail on page 17). Born near the church of St John the Baptist, Jack was blind from the age of six, but

managed to overcome his disability to become, most famously, a builder of roads and bridges. He was other things as well, some less salubrious but we think you'll agree he was mostly a great hero.



Eugene Aram

We are less certain about the school-teacher Eugene Aram, who befriended then murdered 23-year old shoe-maker Daniel Clark in February 1744, see page 39 for the full story. High de Morevill was another badun', the ringleader of four

knights who slaughtered the Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas a Beckett in 1170. The Constable of Knaresborough Castle, he led his violent coterie north after the murder to hide out while the dust settled. Not that he was punished for his deeds. It took his support for a rebellion against Henry II for him to pay a price – losing his ownership of the Castle and lands around Knaresborough.



Cave of Robert Floure

A clear hero was Robert Floure (Flower), the hermit of Knaresborough, who was said to have healing powers and cared for the poor. Upon his death in 1218, a cult sprang up around his memory. His cave, carved out of the face of the limestone cliff

and the remains of his chapel survive, and can be seen near the Wetherby Road end of Abbey Road. Another feature on Abbey Road, but at the other end nearer to Low Bridge, is the Shrine to 'Our Lady of the Crag', carved from the living rock in 1408 by another local hero, John the Mason, after he believed divine intercession had saved his son buried under rubble in a nearby quarry. We discuss Robert the Hermit on page 35.



Mother Shipton

difficult to determine whether prophetess Mother Shipton was heroine or villain; her predictions aroused the ire of public figures and generations since her death, and continue to astound visitors Knaresborough to this

very day. Her legacy is discussed in the visitors' attraction of the Mother Shipton and Petrifying Well parkland on the Harrogate side of the river, and also on page 37.

BED RACE RULES



THE TEAM

- Each team MUST provide the name and contact details of two adult marshals at the time of their application to take part in the Bed Race. It is a requirement of entry on the day that each team's marshals (who must have attended a marshal brief), report to the marshal reception point in the Castle Grounds by 12:00Hrs. Failure to do so will lead to disqualification.
- The bed and runners must be decorated to the published theme of the year. Failure to do so leads to disqualification.
- The bed and team will take part in the parade and must follow the requests at all times of the marshals and race officials.
- The running team [both adult and junior] will be made up of either 6 males, or 6 females, or a mixed team of 3 male and 3 female ... Plus one passenger.

Non Standard mixed teams will be regarded as male.

- A junior team must be in years 8 to 11 inclusive of the school year to qualify for
- The passenger must be no younger than school Year 6 and all passengers must wear protective headgear and lifejackets throughout the race.
- No substitutions will be allowed during the race.
- Riding on the bed except for the passenger is forbidden.
- All competitors must be able to swim.
- During the race all beds must keep to the left unless overtaking or at request of race officials.
- (11)The throwing of objects/liquids is extremely dangerous and is strictly forbidden. Failure to comply leads to disqualification.
- No alcohol to be consumed by the team runners until after the race has ended. Any team found to be under the influence

of alcohol will be disqualified and banned from future races.

- 13 The team must be able to complete the course within 30 minutes. Please ensure you are able to do so before the race on the day.
- 14 Bed race is a family event, all members of the team and parade must conduct themselves appropriately at all times i.e. no swearing, no inappropriate gestures. The organisers reserve the right to withdraw a team at any point.
- Each team must have a named Captain who takes responsibility for ensuring the safety of the team during the race and the parade.
- 16 To enter for the Fastest New Team, no team member must have completed in a previous
- To qualify for the non-club competition, no team member can belong to an England Athletics-affiliated club.
- 18 All Teams to complete a Team Detail Sheet to show any change from the Original Entry Form. This is to have signed parental consent for ALL runners and passengers aged 16 or under. The Detail Sheet will be issued in the team pack at the team brief and must be handed in to the scrutineers on the day. If your team changes category from your original entry form due to changes in runners, you must inform the organisers at least 48 hours before the start of the race; otherwise you will not be eligible for a category prize.
- 19 The provided wrist bands must be worn by all team members and the two helpers throughout the day. Only the team and the two helpers will be allowed into the race start point at Conyngham Hall.
- 20 At least one member of the team must attend the team briefing and collect the team pack. Any trophies won during last year's event must be returned at or before the team briefing.







BED RACE RULES



THE BED

- 1 Each team must provide:
 - A bed decorated in the theme for the year
 - An audible air horn / hooter
 - A helmet for the passenger
 - A lifejacket for the passenger
- When decorated, the bed must not exceed 2 metres in width, 4 metres in length and 3 metres in height.
- Decorations must be removed from the bed before the start of the Race.
- The bed must have no means of mechanical propulsion.
- All beds must have been examined and passed by the scrutineers prior to the start of the Race.
- The Bed numbers must be attached to the Float prior to the Parade and reused for the race. Five race numbers must be displayed, one on the front of the Bed and one on each side of the bed and one on each side of the passenger's helmet. It is the team captain's responsibility to ensure that these stay attached until after The Race.



- Each bed must have a built-in buoyancy aid capable of supporting the bed and the passenger for not less than five minutes, and have an aperture large enough to allow the passenger to escape quickly if required.
- 8 Each bed must:
 - i) Have four wheels of not more than 260mm in diameter including tyres, and a minimum tyre width of 55mm.
 - ii) Allow a gauge of 150mm by 450mm wide to pass under the bed in the direction of travel (ie ground clearance of 150mm and the wheels must be at least 450mm apart, side to side).
 - iii) Allow a gauge of 150mm by1250mm long to pass under the bed at 90 degrees to the direction of travel (ie ground clearance of 150mm and the wheels must be at least 1250mm apart, front to rear).
 - iv) Have a minimum length of 1750mm and a minimum width of 750mm.
 - v) Have a maximum length of 3.0m and a maximum width of 1.35m.
 - vi) Two ropes, not more than 3.5 metres in length, may be attached to the front of the Bed. These must not be secured to any member of the Team. No ropes are to be attached to the rear of the bed. Ropes must not include loops or knots along any part of their length or at the non-bed end/s. Beds may be inspected more than once so please do not tie loops or knots after original scrutineering.

on around England ever since. But it happened first in Knaresborough.

And who cannot admire the political outlook of Guy Fawkes, former resident of nearby Scotton, who tried to blow up the Houses of Parliament in 1605.

Well, the rest of the country may have a problem and burn an effigy of him every 5 November, but to the people of Knaresborough he remains a hero for his innovative approach to dissent. A true trailblazer (though it is usually him that's up in flames!)



TRI-CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS OF KNARESBOROUGH'S HERO: BLIND JACK

Aybe you've had your photo taken sitting next to his statue on that bench in Knaresborough Market Place or sunk a few pints in the fine pub that bears his name. But do you know the real story of John Metcalf, famous as Blind Jack of Knaresborough, who celebrates his three-hundredth birthday on 15 August this year?

roundabout is to be named the John Metcalf Way in his honour. And keeping the transport theme going, in August Harrogate Bus Company will name a No 1 bus after him - 'Blind Jack of Knaresborough'. Celebratory events kick off sedately

Celebrations are being planned for this summer by the Blind Jack Tri-Centenary Committee. brainchild of Knaresborian Bernard Higgins, to fill you in on the great man. Some of the commemorative events will also be included in Knaresborough's annual **feva** festival (festival of entertainment and visual arts, 11 to 20 August).

John Metcalf was a true iack of all trades. Born in a cottage next to the Parish Church, he lost his sight at the age of 6 due to smallpox. But in the next 87 years he overcame his disability to become famous in a wide range of capacities. He was a musician and celebrated bar-room fiddle-player. During

the Jacobite rebellion he was an army recruiter and was at the Battle of Culloden. A father of four (and grandfather of 20), he became famous as a trader of horses but he was also notorious as a drinker, gambler and smuggler. But finally, and most triumphantly, he was England's first great road builder, building 180 miles of road across Yorkshire, Lancashire, Derbyshire and Cheshire, in the process revolutionising transport across the North of England.

with an afternoon tea on Wednesday 28 June organised by Beryl Wood and Tanya Stimpson, director of Vision Support Harrogate District at the Cedar Court Hotel. This venue stands on land where the Queen's Head pub stood in John Metcalf's time. He was resident fiddler there from the age of 15. Another fitting link to the tearaway part of his life will be marked by Roosters Brewery which is bringing out a special Blind Jack Ale to be in the pubs from July to August.

Fittingly, as part of the anniversary, a section of the

To emphasise the remarkable way in which he overcame his disability, a preseason football friendly at Manse Lane between Knaresborough Town and Harrogate Town in early June (date to be fixed) will kick off with an exhibition match between two unsighted football teams from the West Riding FA. The gate money from that event will go towards the three charities being supported by the committee: Vision Support Harrogate District. RNIB Tate House and Henshaws.

BLIND JACK

On Saturday 12 August, as part of **feva**, a Concert in Commemoration of John Metcalf will take place at St John the Baptist Church, organised by Director of Music, Mark Hunter. Also as part of the festival, artwork and poetry about John Metcalf's life and achievements will be on display in Knaresborough Library.

Local singer-songwriter Tim Hunter, along with the Bard of Saltaire, Eddie Lawler will perform songs inspired by John Metcalf and his life on his actual anniversary, 15 August, at the Orb. Tim is also to have his CD 'John Metcalf - Blind Jack of Knaresborough – A Man of Vision' available to purchase on the night.

Also on the 15th, the culmination of the Blind Jack Anniversary Day Celebrations is taking place at Henshaws Art & Crafts Centre.

Blind Jack was one of the heroes of Knaresborough, a man who overcame his disability to live a very full life of 92 years, dying in Spofforth in 1810. His road building activities began when he was 50 and involved him in using special tools including his adapted 'viameter', which measured distances and allowed him to operate by touch.

Metcalf believed a good road should have good foundations and have a smooth convex surface to allow rainwater to flow quickly into ditches at the side. Among other achievements he worked out how to build a road across a bog using a series of rafts made from ling (heather) and furze (gorse) tied in bundles as foundations. Other engineers of the time believed it could not be done, so this innovation established his reputation as one of the country's premier road builders.

A biography was written during his lifetime: *The Life of John Metcalf, Commonly Called Blind Jack of Knaresborough,* by E. and R. Peck, York, in 1795 and, in 1804.








TOP TIPS FOR SPECTATORS

BEFORE YOU LEAVE HOME

Over the last few years the Great Knaresborough Bed Race has been held in beautiful sunny weather, so make sure that you pack lots of sun cream and water before leaving home. Give yourselves plenty of time to view the decorated beds in the Castle grounds and to choose your favourite viewing spots for the Parade and the Race.

HOW TO GET TO THE GREAT KNARESBOROUGH BED RACE

It is easy to get to Knaresborough, whether on foot, by public transport or by car. Remember though that roads start closing from noon, so plan your journey early. There is a regular train service from Leeds, Harrogate and York as well as numerous buses from Harrogate. If travelling by car, head for the free Park and Ride facilities from Knaresborough Technology Park on Manse lane and from ALM on Grimbalds Crag. There will be a free bus service running from these car parks to Chapel Street in the Town Centre. Parking is banned along the route on race day.

REFRESHMENTS

Knaresborough has many fantastic cafes and pubs offering a wide range of refreshments for you to enjoy. Please do not bring alcohol into Conyngham Hall fields, there are bars available.



WHERE TO WATCH

Get to know the course. Look at the map in advance so you understand what to expect on race day. The Castle Top is a must if you want to experience the expectation and excitement of seeing all the beds in their finery before the Parade. The High Street is a fantastic place to watch the parade and listen to the music played by the marching bands.

The Race starts and ends in Conyngham Hall field where there will be a large LED screen where you can watch the race unfold. There is also live entertainment, childrens entertainment and bars. This programme is your entry ticket into this area. For those without a programme there is a charge of £2 for entry into the area. In addition, there are many places to watch the race. Cheer the teams as they struggle up Castle Ings, join the crowds in the Market Place, gasp as the teams hurtle down the High Street and watch the dramas unfold at the famous river crossing just before the finishing line.

To enable accessibility for all there will be a disabled viewing area in the Market Place, see the map for the location.

ENJOY YOURSELVES AND STAY SAFE

This is a really happy day in Knaresborough's calendar so please join in the fun and enjoy yourselves. There are numerous marshals along the route. If you need any assistance, please seek help from one of them. They have access to First aiders and Ambulance facilities. ROBERT THE HERMIT – A GOOD UN

onsidered by many to be one of the outstanding saints of the 13th Century, Robert the Hermit earned a special place in the hearts of the people of Knaresborough and those in the locality for his care for the poor and sick.

He was born Robert Floure or Flower in York in 1160. Called to the monastic life he visited a knight who lived in a cave, which is still there, beside the River Nidd near the Wetherby Road, Initially, he shared the cave until the knight, pardoned by the King, left for home. He developed a chapel to St Giles surrounding the cave and lived there for many years fending off the ruffians plaguing the area and offering help to those in need.

For a time he moved to a nearby hermitage built for him by a wealthy widow but was soon in trouble, this time with William de Stuteville, the constable of Knaresborough Castle who accused him of harbouring thieves and outlaws. Having his hermitage destroyed by the forces of law under de Stuteville, Robert returned to the cave at Knaresborough, where he stayed for the rest of his life

Although living as a recluse, his piety soon attracted followers and gifts from local benefactors.

A number of stories of St Robert exist. One concerns his complaining about the King's deer eating his crops. Sir William, making fun of the saint, invited Robert to catch the offending beasts. By repute, Robert not only managed to herd the deer into his barn, but also harnessed them to his plough and set them to work.

Before his death in 1218 St Robert established an order of Trinitarian Friars and founded Knaresborough Priory on Abbey Road. His brother Walter, then Mayor of York, paid for some new buildings, including a chapel dedicated to the Holy Cross. The floor plan of this can still be seen alongside Robert's cave. It is said that King John also visited him.

St Robert was buried in his chapel cut from the steep rocky crags by the river, where it was said that medicinal oil flowed from his tomb which attracted thousands of pilgrims in later years.

JOHN AND THE CHAPEL

Bridge and you will see the wonderful Shrine to our Lady of the Crag hewn from the cliff face, and the figure of a medieval knight standing guard over the entrance. The Shrine, actually a Chapel, is tiny but is very special, and has been a site of pilgrimage since the start of the 15th Century. It is approached by a steep path; a visit is very rewarding.

We know about the foundation of the Shrine. It was carved from the rock in 1408 by a local master mason. John the Mason, in fulfilment of his vow to build a Chapel to the Virgin Mary.

The story goes that his son was buried under a fall of rocks in a nearby quarry. John prayed fervently to the Virgin Mary that his son might be saved from death. When the lad emerged almost miraculously unscathed from the rubble John carried out his vow to excavate the Shrine in thanksgiving.

High above the Chapel at the top of the Gorge is Fort Montague, sometimes known as the House in the Rock, which was carved out of the cliff and decorated with battlements by those other local heroes, Thomas Hill and his son. They carried out the work between 1770 and 1791.







MOTHER SHIPTON KNOWS WHO'LL WIN



✓ other Shipton is the world famous prophetess who was born in Knaresborough in 1488, in a cave on the Harrogate side of the River Nidd.

Called Ursula Southeil at birth she later married a

Tobias Shipton from York. As she became old and famed for predicting the future, she became known as Mother Shipton.

She is England's most famous prophetess, foretelling the fate of kings, gueens and courtiers. In the 1530s she attracted the attention and ire of the Lord Chancellor, Cardinal Wolsey, (after the king the most powerful man in the land and who was also Archbishop of York), when she said that he will never set foot in his diocese. Banished from London by Henry VIII Wolsey travelled to York but was arrested several miles short. He was returned to London but died on the way. Mother Shipton had been right.

MOTHER SHIPTON - a sealed bronze statue based on Mother Shipton is to be sited in Knaresborough's market place during 2017.

She said that the World will come to an end when High Bridge in Knaresborough, part of the Bed Race course, collapses into the River Nidd. Today, there is a pub called World's End by the bridge.

The cave where she was born is now part of the Mother Shipton tourist attraction, whose entrance is at Prophecy Lodge by High Bridge. This is said to be the oldest tourist destination in England, receiving visitors since 1630.

Her prophecies may have become embellished over time but there is no doubt that Mother Shipton remains a true local heroine. A bronze statue of her has been commissioned for the market place to accompany that of Blind Jack.

> Also part of the Mother Shipton Park is the Petrifying Well where items left under the dripping water are turned to stone within three to five months. There are plenty of items to see, including an array of teddy bears. This is England's only petrifying well, made of two types of rock – tufa and travertine. 3,200 litres of water flow over the well every hour, winter, summer, rain or drought.

> It is near to the cave in which Mother Shipton was born and local people once believed the well to be magical.

She also foretold of the invention of iron ships, the Great Fire of London and the defeat of the Spanish Armada, all to happen long after her death.



THE MURDEROUS SCHOOLTEACHER EUGENE ARAM



'Calm, and compos'd my soul her journey takes, No guild that troubles, and no heart that aches!' - written by Eugene Aram while in prison.

Definitely a bad man, and not just because of his vocation, Eugene Aram was a murderous schoolteacher who, in his day, was as famous as the highwayman Dick Turpin. Small children were warned that if they were not good and went to sleep they would have to conjugate their verbs with Mr Aram.

In 1744, Eugene was instilling the virtues of education into the heads of young schoolchildren in Knaresborough (still a task) and was friendly with 23-year old Daniel Clark. Daniel, a shoe-mender, had somehow managed to get himself affianced to a young gentlewoman expected to inherit some wealth.

The idea that her funds would soon come within his control went to his head and he acquired a number of valuable objects on credit

Suddenly, Daniel disappeared, as did his valuables, and it was thought he had fled from the retribution of creditors. The last persons seen with him with him were the schoolteacher Eugene Aram and a flax weaver, Richard Houseman. Knowing that Aram was Daniel's friend, his house and garden were searched and several of the missing items were turned up. Aram claimed he had helped his friend escape, saying that the goods must have been buried before Daniel took off.

Daniel remained missing and it wasn't long though before suspicion arose about the role of Eugene Aram. Close to being cornered, Aram himself disappeared, leaving behind his wife and children in Knaresborough.

Years passed. In 1758, while digging for limestone on Thistle Hill, a labourer found a skeleton which Mrs Aram said might be Daniel Clark's. Richard Houseman was still living locally and was subjected to intense interrogation. He confessed that Eugene Aram had murdered Clark but that this skeleton was not his. Houseman said he had helped Aram dispose of the body in the floor of the cave of St Robert the Hermit. Daniel Clark's remains were found with a hole drilled into the back of the skull.




THE MURDEROUS SCHOOLTEACHER EUGENE ARAM

It so happened that a Yorkshire trader had occasion to visit King's Lynn and returned saying that a schoolteacher there bore an uncanny resemblance to Master Aram. Constables were despatched and came back with the errant teacher who was lodged in York Goal to await his trial


The wait was a long one, a year, and it gave Aram time to work on a comparative dictionary. His defence was that the skeleton was not Daniel Clark's and there was no proof of murder. He also claimed to have been ill at the time of Clark's disappearance and went around on crutches. It was to no avail and in August 1759 Eugene Aram was sentenced to death in York with his body being thereafter brought to Knaresborough where it was hung in a gibbet. His skull was removed and is today on show in the Old Gaol House in King's Lynn next to a fragment of the skull of Daniel Clark

Thomas Hood wrote a poem about him and he was the subject of a book by Bulwer Lytton and a play by Henry Irving. Aram's own academic legacy was also impressive. His ability to argue successfully against the then accepted belief in the derivation of Latin from Greek meant he has been called 'the true father of comparative philology'.

Well, what about that then? Still a villain in our book!



PETE'S WONDERFUL KNARESBOROUGH MODEL

Visitors to last year's Picnic in the Park, the annual free music show held as part of the Knaresborough celebrations feva (festival entertainment and visual arts held in August) were entranced by the model of the town created by Pete Goss.

The model is an authentic and accurate reconstruction of the town, based on the railway station, tunnel and viaduct over the Nidd Gorge, though he has moved around certain well-known buildings to make the model work.

Pete has included the Castle Keep, part of the Market Place and High Street, Waterside and the town's renowned black and white checkerboard buildings. He even has some models of Civil War re-enactors in the grounds of the Castle.

It is a substantial creation and filled much of the main room at Knaresborough House. The centre piece, the station, has model trains running through which are exact reproductions of trains that have actually served the town over the years. Pete Goss was advised on these by specialist Steve Bellamy of Spacey Houses.

Pete lives in Shiptonthorpe near Market Weighton in East Yorkshire. He is a retired architectural technician and an internationallyfamous modeller. His first interest is building models and his second is model railways.



Pete chose to model Knaresborough "... because it is an interesting town with recognisable and unique buildings, and with its topography I believe it would be a difficult challenge. Besides that, no one else had made such a detailed model of the town "

He told us that he "... works in his workshop at home. The model took seven years and was completed in 2015." It is by far the biggest and most complex that he has ever made and he travels to exhibitions all over Europe.

The Knaresborough Model has won many major awards including the National Model Award for the 2015 Railway Modeller Cup.

Councillor Christine Willoughby was instrumental in bringing the model to Knaresborough for feva. It offered a free opportunity for residents and visitors to see the model, with people being asked to show their appreciation by making a donation to the St Michael's Hospice Charity. Hopefully, it will be back again this August.

A local hospital group contacted the Knaresborough Lions for help and advice which was, as ever, freely given. The organisers, a hospital group in Australia, staged the event to raise money for cardiac facilities at its community hospitals and based much of its organisation on the Great Knaresborough forerunner, although it described the event as an "... entertaining spectacle of fancy dress and elite athleticism rolled into five kilometres of competitive bed racing."

The event's website states: "Runners have to be fit, fanatical and frankly a bit mad, while the Bed Bug (passenger) has to be light, able to shout loudly and happy to place their safety in the hands of a team of runners." Around the world there are 1.4 million Lions in more than 46,000 clubs in 200 countries. The Lions Club in Knaresborough was formed in 1987 and has been involved in the organisation of Bed Race since 1993, initially assisting the original organisers, the Round Table, and then running the event on its own from 1998. We do much more than Bed Race, holding fund raising events, helping community activities and supporting welfare needs throughout the year.

From the start, Lions have been dedicated to serving those most in need - our motto is simply 'We Serve'. We actually achieved this by the second half of 2016 and now aim to serve 200 million. Lions are most associated with issues such as water aid, sight related problems, diabetes, the elderly, youth welfare and disaster relief, but the support available from Lions clubs is not restricted to these.
